For book Arthur's Bad-News Day, Level M Script Levels: Grade 1 (Upper), Grade 2 (Middle), Grade 3 (Early) Word Count: 426

Script Summary:

Arthur has been an only child for eight years and has just found out that a little sister is on the way. At first, Arthur is unhappy about the many ways in which her arrival will disrupt his life. He changes his tune after he holds her for the first time.

Objectives and Assessment

Monitor students to determine if they can:

- consistently read their lines with appropriate rate and accuracy
- consistently read their lines with appropriate expression, including pause, inflection, and intonation
- follow along silently and listen for spoken cues

Using the Scripts:

- Each role is assigned a reading level according to the syntactic and semantic difficulty encountered. Feel free to divide roles further to include more readers in a group.
- Discuss vocabulary and encourage readers to practice their lines to promote fluent delivery of the script.
- Have readers highlight their lines on the scripts, and encourage them to follow along as everyone reads.

High-frequency words: some, play, with, now Story words: amazing, awful, diapers, news, tickling, yuck

Narrator 1:

Arthur:

Narrator 1:

Narrator 2:

In fact, Arthur didn't like the news at all.

Mom:

You are going to have a baby sister. Would you like that Arthur?

Narrator 1:

Arthur didn't like that at all. He didn't want to share his parents with anybody. His life was perfect the way it was.

Arthur:

I know what will happen. My friend Jeff got a baby sister last year. His parents don't have time for him now.

Narrator 3:

Arthur was feeling **awful**.

He knew parents took a lot of time to change **diapers**. Stinky diapers.

Arthur:

YUCK! Diapers.

And it gets worse. Mom said I have to share my bedroom with the baby. Diapers in my room! I told Mom that I don't want a baby sister. And I sure don't want to share my Disneyland cup.

Narrator 4:

None of what Arthur said seemed to matter.

The new baby was coming home today.

Arthur was not happy.

He didn't want to come out of his room. HIS room.

Narrator 3:

He wanted to tell his parents to take the baby back. But then he saw his dad. His dad was carrying some pink blankets. Arthur could barely see the small baby. He did see his grandma.

Arthur:

Narrator 1:

Narrator 2:

Arthur's baby sister reaches out and grabs his finger. She won't let go! She seems to know that Arthur is her big brother.
